The buying of animals (pigs, chickens) for the community was started in a small way and has begun to take off, especially with home groups that Ann Potts established on her visits last year. To get to this stage the charity funded training sessions for the farmers and veterinary workers and

Orphanage School News

The Mityana Charity has been involved with the Orphanage School in Mityana for many years. We have been paying the teachers salaries for 3 years and also sending out "Porridge money" to ensure that the children who live at the school get one basic meal of "porridge" a day. (maize flour, millet and water stewed together) British Airways employees from Terminal 4 have given donations to help finance this.

The school was started by a Ugandan lady Margaret, who has lived on the site for many years and whose own children have all died of AIDS. She has taken in orphan children off the streets to give them a roof over their heads and given them an education but as a result the school is very crowded and is still ill equipped. Approximately 80 children live at the school whilst another 300 live with grandparents/ extended family. Mityana Charity has bought beds for the hostel children (Wooburn church and Lis Hayes) and cows to try and give a supply of milk and calves.

In 1997 a youth group went out from St Sebastian's and built another classroom ; there has been another group who installed gutters and a water tank. However there are still no locks on the doors or grids on the windows so books, desks and stationary can be stolen.

However, the head teacher is organised and directs her dedicated staff, as well as possible with other donations from various churches (Frindsbury, Rochester) and many girls who have spent GAP months in Mityana with the OASIS group.

We have recently paid for a part time cook/ matron but it has become apparent that another full time person is needed and also more organised overall management. To this end we are now working with the Esubi Trust which is a recently formed UK charity, started by a volunteer who spent 9 months in Mityana with OASIS. We are confident that we will be able to achieve better directed aid to the Orphanage in this way in the next few years. (Sarah Birch)

Last February a group of 9 youth and 16 adults planned and undertook a trip to Mityana. In the months before the trip we spent a lot of time fundraising; we held dinner parties, a car wash, karaoke, a new year's eve party, a jumble sale, went bag packing in a supermarket and much more. We raised over £10,000 and used this for projects in Mityana. While we were there we visited various health clinics, churches, schools and an orphanage. With the money raised we provided much needed learning resources in schools, carried out various repairs at the orphanage, painted classrooms in a primary school and constructed a roof for a medical centre. Our work was very much appreciated, and we all learnt a lot from our time out there. A return trip is currently being planned and we hope that this year we will be able to do even more for our friends in Mityana.

A REPORT BY REV. MOSES SEMUGOOMA – DIOCESAN HEALTH COORDINATOR ON THE STATE OF KYANAMUGERA HEALTH UNIT IN THE DIOCESE OF MITYANA.

My sisters and brothers in UK in particular Dr. Weirs, allow me deliver my report to you as per subject.

PREAMBLE:

And where as the history of Kyanamugera Health Centre II goes way back in the 1980s, originally it was commenced as a very small unit to give first Aid to the Rural communities around who had been denied chance of getting any First Aid in case of any accident or illness.

When it started, it lacked good infrastructures and it was closed down for almost 3 years when it had neither a nurse nor administration.

How the clinic was when we started.

By the time you joined in hand towards Kyanamugera health Centre II, the state was really alarming. For the local community had fought tooth and nail to have the foundation set up and also to start the construction work.

Much as they strived, there was no way as no sooner had they reached the window level than the work stopped for they run the out of funds. Fortunately when you came in we resumed the construction work which is now promising for as I talk six rooms have been completed in such a way that out of these rooms, two have been fully painted and in

fact they are giving a beautiful and nice scenery to the health centre.

The community is very grateful to this work. Well done.

This new arrangement has gone far to separating the health centre from the staff quarter, which originally were in relationship with one another as a dual purpose.

Your brotherly hand has really played a paramount role in putting the health centre, which has forced many to admire the place.

Due to the availability of enough rooms now, the number of clients has increased and this has also created a bigger room for the visiting Doctor at least to avail himself once a week and to be particular this is done every Tuesday.

It has also eased the work of the Diocesan coordinator of inspection and monitoring.

More to what has been done on this centre, as per the list of equipment sent to you, all of which were purchased and installed properly. Instead of a sterilizer, we replaced it with a ward screen (4 panels) and a centrifuge for the sterilizer was already given by JMS (Joint Medical Stores).

It can be recalled that one Lydia among the trainees is doing a good work at our laboratory

services. This has actually depicted the real image we anticipated at the beginning.

Further more, in the health centre structure, the wooden ceiling was put in place. This ensures us that the drugs will not be damaged due to temperature changes.

In addition to that an eight thousand-litre water tank was bought, however, we have not yet harvested because the water gerters were not budgeted for. Sixteen of which are needed at a cost of ten thousand each.

More so, two solar systems were bought and one was installed in the health centre and the other one in the staff quarters.

In the other hand, much as we have a numerous achievements, there also a number of challenges experienced among which include:

1. During the period of construction, the season was dry which bought about the problem of water and that forced us to hire a water bowzer to necessitate us ease work. Yet on the budget water was under looked.
2. It was really hard to carry out the construction concurrently as it would need to first shift the staff so as to work on the centre ceiling and this totally made the delay of the report.
3. Due to changes in petroleum products this created a rise in the prices

of even other goods including transportation.

4. There was a problem of unreliable electricity which led metallic products like doors, windows their prices to rise.

Despite the above, staff members are enjoying the newly established facility. Future prospects, we intend to erect a maternity ward as a facility to ease on the number of expecting women who die in the villages due to lack of these services.

In a nut shell, the Diocesan vision has been met and this can be projected from the beneficiaries which is the community more than twenty villages are being served by this centre.

I wish at this juncture to sincerely extend thanks to Hilden Charity for the support. Actually I don't have proper words to use but just allow me to say "where there is co-operation and unity everything is possible when God is the HEAD. REMEMBER, NO Institution can stand on its own", "As it is said, in a forest tree leans on tree, in a nation man on man". We also thank all those who support us in one-way or the other.

As I always tell, that Health is life, which life is full of challenges, we must face these challenges as our predecessors left to us by improving on quality services so as to create meaningful life. Therefore, the main objective

should be on self-review and renewal. That is to take stock of the achievements recorded and short comings and then make a strategic plan to address the challenges of the future in order to fulfill the mission of Jesus that **“I came that they may have life and have it in abundance”**. Jn 10:10

I am happy to say that Mityana Diocese has been nourished, by our brothers and sisters abroad and has the capacity to catch up with modernity, since it has started having been well fed with vitamins A, B and C.

- A** to have a good vision
- B** to have the dynamism
- C** to keep shining

We are assured of continued support in this endeavour which is a dynamic and progressive life to avoid extinction.

PAUSE:

This is on top of the other on going Health projects and those in plan; like: -

- Completion and equipping of all the Diocesan Health units.
- Installation of water in all Health centres.

- Construction of staff quarters at all the Health centres.

This seems to be a very big task to accomplish but I am sure we can do it within time as Jesus is Lord. What is important is to have vision for the future. However, as it is said. “Ask God for as much as you like but keep a spade in your hand”. Therefore, I would like to conclude with the words of Churchill by saying, Give us the tools and we shall finish the job”



Lwankuba Farm belongs to Mityana Diocese. It covers 500 acres of land on three villages with scattered squatters about 110 homes. The average number of these people practice subsistence farming (grow only food for their families). The farm has one acre of Eucalyptus forest planted by the retired Bishop Wilson Mutebi. Poorly looked after due to financial constraints.

The soil of Lwankuba is fertile crops like:- beans, maize, Irish potatoes grow very well also bananas, pineapples are doing very well. Out of 500 acres about 300 acres are un cultivated.

Lwankuba Farm is blessed with two pairs of oxen plus all working tools. These were bought by Nabukenya through Mityana Charity UK. During the last season, 8 acres were ploughed using the animals though the weather conditions were not good. Irish potatoes, cabbages and maize were planted and we are expecting good yield.

Also animals have started transporting the produce from the garden plus fetching water for themselves and farm use. The community has liked the animal traction and transport. We are going to assist them with ploughing.

PIGS/ GOAT SCHEME

Ann Nabukenya started this scheme in Sept. 2006 when she sent 370 Pounds for buying piglets and goats. In this scheme, 4 teachers, three farm workers, 35 parents; men and women benefited and animals are doing well. The aim of this scheme is to uplift the economic situation in the community so that parents can sell the young piglets and be able to buy school requirements and home needs. Mr. Stanley Mukasa has done a commendable work in the community by giving advise and treating the animals.

"New Life Project"

In this new approach, we are going to start demonstration plots, to grow various crops, using organic manure instead of artificial fertilizers. The community will be visiting the farm on open days i.e every Wednesday and we shall arrange seminars for Lwankuba community and later for the whole Diocese. People will sencetasied on how to make manures and application using the local things around them,ie Animal dung, kitchen wastes, chicken droppings etc. Also fruit drying will start soon as we grow fruits like pineapple and sweet bananas etc for local use and export in future. To achieve this we shall have a multi-sectoral approach where farmers in the society have to come in.

Arrangements are under way to have organic training officer. One young man has been selected for training. The farm will show the technique to be used in sustainable agriculture. It will also be used as a training ground for all persons/ people of the Diocese and the whole country Uganda.

Objectives:

To have rural communities able to produce good health, quality food as food security and income.

To have income generating projects run by the people themselves

To have trained and skilled societies so that they are able to address problems that can face them during their day to day farming activities.

To have people who can reason, protect their rights in production, processing and marketing of their products.

To have people who can have healthy lives by eating health food, drinks nutritive at all times.

Transport:

Animals can assist the family to transport food and farm produce from their garden and to market.

In the first attached picture, they are used for fetching water for teaching staff, farm workers, watering crops during the dry season plus water for their own consumption.



Digging:

Less labour and less time used, large land cleared.

Using a hoe, you put in more energy and more time and you produce little. But when you use animals, you put in less labour, less time but you produce more. In the second attached picture, animal traction is in operation at Lwankuba Farm. One pair of oxen can plough half an acre in 4 hours. Therefore two pairs plough an acre in the same time.

When you use the animals, you need no spare parts, no fuel and any other mechanical expenses.




